



Charles Sampson Bing, Sr., a man of strong conviction, belief in God, the good of humankind and excellence, and a sincere lover of family and music, was passionate, caring, discreet and diligent in the use of resources. Charles Bing, the husband, father, sibling, educator, colleague, friend and student advocate lived the life of a servant leader, always giving a helping hand and sharing his knowledge and experience in a positive and innovative way. A glimpse of his life can be viewed through his famous quotes which depicted his philosophy of life:

Your family is really all that you will ever have!

Charles Sampson Bing, Sr. was born November 6, 1937, to Ida and Johnny Bing in Plant City, Florida. He was the third child and one of ten of Mother Ida's children. His father preceded him in death before he was born. However, Charles' innate fatherly instincts moved him to assume the role of father to his siblings, relatives and many other individuals throughout his lifetime.

He was an exceptional father in many different ways to his children, Melody, Valerie and Harmon and a devoted husband to his supportive wife, Betty for thirty-nine years. Family was important. His family was extensive and far reaching. Many were blessed as he generously provided housing and financial assistance so that they could further their education and/or move on to new heights in their lives.

You won't find many true friends during your life time. If you find one, you are lucky!

Prof Bing, as he was affectionately called, provided guidance, mentorship and affection to his students and acquaintances as he attempted to ignite the inner strength required for survival and excellence. He was an outstanding role model for his children and hundreds of others. DeAnna Carpenter commented that "He was very sweet and kind, and always had something positive to say." Antonio C. Drayton observed that "He was a really, really smart person and a dear friend of mine." Renee Gordon recalls that "He was so passionate and wanted to bring it out in everybody else." Charles Bing was a friend in need and a friend indeed!

Charles Bing's compassion and concern for others came from his Christian background, which began in his home under the watch care of Mother Ida, and was certified when he accepted Christ and was baptized at Mt. Zion M.B. Church in Tildenville, Florida. He unashamedly loved, esteemed, and cherished God, as well as the many people he encountered throughout his life. The way he handled difficulty, faced and progressed through life was indicative of his faith and the fact that his steps were ordered by God and the presence of God was within him.

Education is the only way out!

Charles Bing attended the public schools in Plant City, graduated from Jones High School in Orlando, Florida and subsequently attended Florida A&M University on a music scholarship. He

earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Music Education in 1960. While an undergraduate, he was awarded the Outstanding Bandsman Award and listed in Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. He received the Masters Degree in Music Education from Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana and did further study at the University of Illinois. He received a scholarship to attend the first Cumberland Forest National Music Camp at Morehead State University. For Charles Bing, education was not only a way out; it was a way up the career ladder.

Charles Bing used education to pursue and share his musical acumen extensively. Upon his graduation in 1960 he was hired to teach in the Florida A&M University Music Department where he worked diligently with unyielding pride for 45 years. He progressed through the faculty ranks to Associate Professor; served as coordinator of student advisement, chairman of instrumental music, associate director of the Marching and Symphonic Bands, director of the University Pep Band, and director of Brass Ensemble and Lower Brass Winds for the Symphonic and Marching Bands. He was a staff member of the FAMU Marching "100" Summer Band Camp and a founding member of the FAMU Chamber Brass Players.

A conductor extraordinaire, he served as guest conductor throughout the southern United States, conductor of the Florida A&M University ROTC Band, and director of Lower Brass Winds in the McDonald's All American High School Band. Additionally, he served as adjudicator and clinician for many competitions, and guest trombonist and consultant throughout Florida, Georgia and other southern states.

Professor Bing was distinguished because of his extraordinary work ethic, dignity and humility. Thus, he received numerous awards. Among them were Outstanding Service Awards for conducting the ROTC Band by the FAMU Military Science Department, as assistant director of the Symphonic and Marching Bands, and as director of the University Pep Band. He was recipient of the 1993 Florida A&M University Teacher of the Year Award and subsequently one of the first recipients of the State of Florida Teacher Incentive Program Awards. Among his most cherished moments was the establishment of the Charles S. Bing Scholarship for Outstanding Musicianship, which was initiated in 2004 by the Marching "100" Alumni Band Association.

Professor Bing's legacies reached beyond the campus of Florida A&M University through the students he helped to mold and shape, as well as the intellect and wisdom that he shared with his peers. Antonio C. Drayton, head drum major of the "Marching 100" attested that He had a wealth of knowledge." Dr. Julian White commended him for being "the glue that held the band and the band staff together." The Tallahassee Democrat Newspaper noted that he was a "Professor who expected Perfection." All of these characteristics permeated his membership in the Music Educators National Conference, Florida Music Educators Association, College Band Directors National Association, Kappa Fai Band Fraternity, Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Florida College Music Educators Association, Florida Bandmasters Association and Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia Music Fraternity.

Charles Sampson Bing honored God by using his gifts and serving his fellow man well. He leaves many comforting and cherished memories to his dedicated wife, Bettye Bing, daughters: Melody Bing, Valerie Bing (Tory); son, Harmon Bing (Theresa); grandchildren: Christopher, Brittany, Destinee, Jai, Charlea, Jalen and Gianna; mother-in-law, Bernice Butts; Godmother, Annie Felder; siblings: Samuel Bing (Lula), Arthur Wright (Audrey), Carrie Hoffman, James Wright, Bernice Robinson (Robbie), Elva Adams, Marjorie Sledge and Vickie Felder; favorite nephews: Reginald Windham (Linda) and Ernest Hoffman; and a host of other devoted nieces, nephews, cousins, colleagues and friends.
